A Message from our Founder and Chair Her Majesty Queen Noor



The King Hussein Foundation has always been guided by a belief that development must begin with people, grounded in dignity, compassion, and a shared responsibility to future generations. This conviction has informed the Foundation’s work over decades, offering continuity and purpose as contexts evolved and priorities shifted.

In 2025, the Foundation continued its work within an increasingly complex regional and global environment. We were able to sustain and expand our programmatic impact because of the trust of long-standing partners, the confidence of new donors, and the unwavering commitment of our teams across Jordan. Their dedication ensured the continuity of essential services, sustained engagement in national initiatives, and meaningful contributions to policy dialogue supporting Jordan’s development.

As we look toward 2026, we do so with reflection and gratitude, marking forty years since two of our earliest institutions first opened their doors: the National Music Conservatory and the Institute for Family Health. Both were founded in 1986 as purposeful responses to deeply felt needs, shaped by the conviction that culture and health are fundamental to human dignity and social cohesion.

The National Music Conservatory began with three Jordanian teachers and forty-five young students learning the violin. From that modest beginning grew an academic home for music that affirmed discipline, creativity, and cultural expression, opening pathways for young people to discover their voice and contribute meaningfully to Jordan’s cultural life.

That same year, the Institute for Family Health opened in Sweileh, bringing medical, psychosocial, and rehabilitation services together under one roof. Its founding vision reflected a belief long championed by King Hussein that the strength of a nation lies in the well-being of its people, and that care must be holistic, compassionate, and accessible, especially for those most at risk.

These beginnings remind us that lasting impact is built patiently through listening, trust, and the courage to act with foresight. That same spirit guided us in 2025 as we continued translating vision into practice, including advancing the integration of a climate lens across our programs, recognizing our shared responsibility to protect both people and the environment they depend on.

The year behind us was not without challenge, but it reaffirmed a truth shaped by experience: when conviction is matched by partnership and dedication, progress remains possible. The pages that follow reflect this shared journey, faithful to our legacy, and with hope for and faith in the generations to come.

Our Journey

The journey began more than forty years ago with a belief championed by His Majesty King Hussein Bin Talal and carried forward by Her Majesty Queen Noor Al Hussein: that every person deserves dignity, opportunity, and the chance to thrive.

In 1985, this vision was institutionalized through the Noor Al Hussein Foundation and its pioneering, people-centered development models advancing women's empowerment, progressive education, comprehensive family health, livelihoods, and support for refugees. These efforts reshaped community development in Jordan and set standards that continue to inspire inclusive practice across the region.

In 1999, to carry forward the humanitarian vision and legacy of King Hussein, the King Hussein Foundation built upon these early models and expanded the work of its seven multidisciplinary institutions, which together advance socio-economic, educational, health, and cultural opportunities for women, youth, and marginalized communities in Jordan and beyond.

Over time, this collective effort has evolved into a leading platform for inclusive, human rights-based development that delivers measurable impact. Guided by evidence and strengthened through partnerships, the King Hussein Foundation builds community capacity, expands equitable access to essential services, strengthens systems through scalable models, and integrates environmental and climate considerations across its programs.

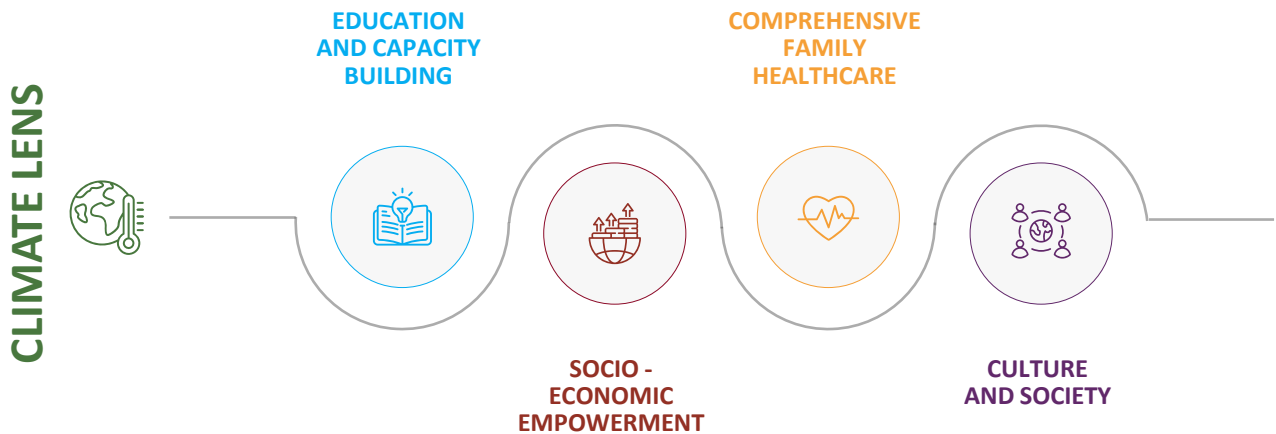

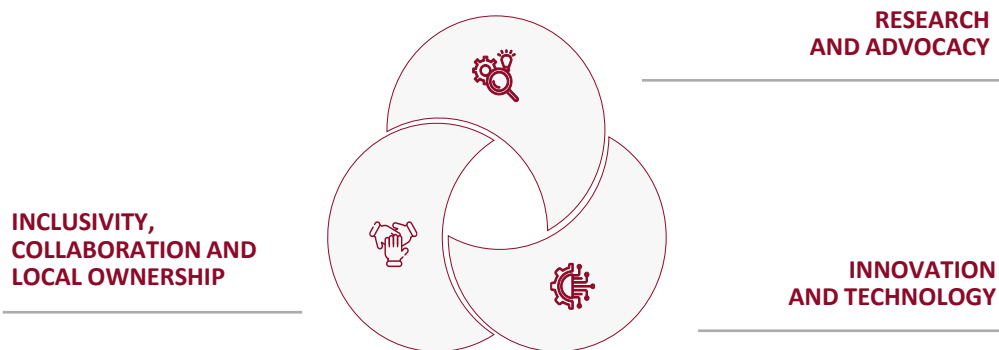
Building Resilience for a Sustainable Future

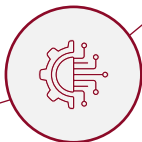

From Vision to Measurable Action

In 2025, the Community Resilience Model advanced from concept to implementation through the establishment of the Climate Resilience and Environmental Sustainability Unit to coordinate delivery and evidence-based action. Key measures included **staff climate knowledge sessions**; a baseline survey and **greenhouse gas emissions audit** informing a reduction roadmap, the adoption of **environmental and social sustainability KPIs**; and the rollout of **climate programs** aligned with national priorities and global best practices. Together, these actions anchored the model as an operational pathway toward long-term resilience and sustainability.

Our holistic model diligently responds to Jordan's socio-economic, humanitarian crisis, and climate change challenges. 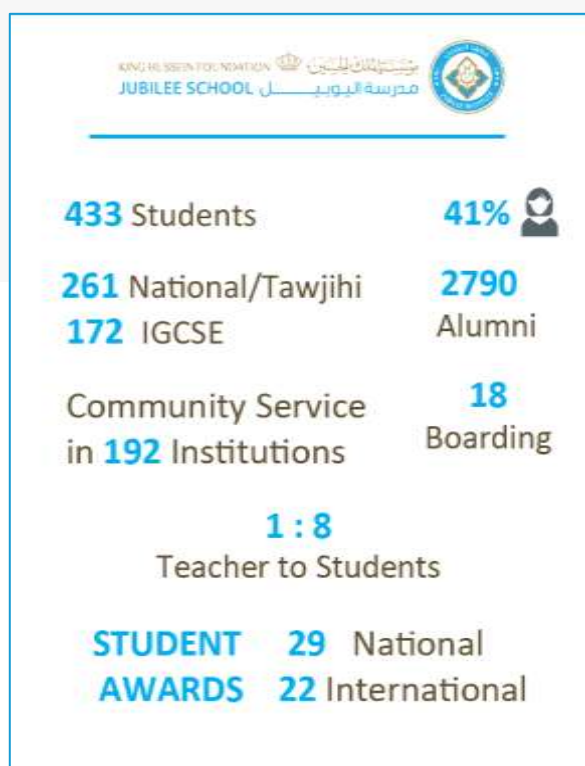
Our Work in Education

The **Jubilee School** cultivates creativity, innovation, and ethical leadership among its outstanding students, preparing socially responsible, critical thinkers equipped to address challenges within their communities and contribute meaningfully to Jordan and the wider world.



Levelling the Playing Field for Meritorious Students

Jubilee School remains committed to equitable access through scholarships and financial aid awarded on the basis of student merit and family financial capacity, ensuring that all students can fully participate in the Jubilee experience.

The School also supports students in securing university scholarships. By the end of the 2024–2025 academic year, 236 scholarship and financial aid offers had been extended to the Class of 2025 by leading universities worldwide, reflecting Jubilee’s commitment to excellence and global opportunity.

Tawjihi

A total of **79%** of Jubilee students achieved scores above **90%** in the Tawjihi, including **41%** scoring above **95%**, reflecting outstanding academic performance.

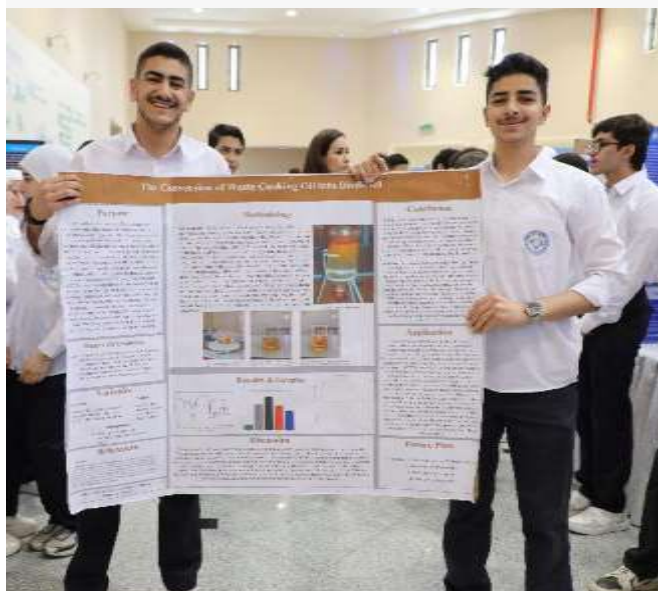

Jubilee FabLab Opens to Unleash Students' Innovation

To enhance students' access to school-based facilities for developing and producing project prototypes, the Jubilee Institute's FabLab provides a state-of-the-art learning environment that fosters creativity, innovation, and hands-on learning. Equipped with advanced technologies, including 3D printing, laser cutting, and CNC manufacturing, the FabLab enables students to apply programming, digital design, and modern fabrication skills in practice.



A Day of Healing and Community Impact

In collaboration with the Institute for Family Health, the Jubilee Institute, and the Greater Amman Municipality, organized a large-scale Free Medical Day at Queen Rania Park - East Amman, providing essential healthcare services to underserved families from Um Nuwwarah, Jabal Al-Naser, and nearby areas.

Over the course of seven hours, the event transformed the park into a fully functional medical hub, offering examinations, medications, psychosocial support, preventive education, and specialist referrals. The day also fostered youth engagement, with medical students and Jubilee School volunteers contributing to a warm, community-centered environment designed around World Children's Day.

This initiative reflects the Foundation's commitment to expanding equitable access to healthcare and strengthening community resilience through coordinated, multi-sector collaboration.

Boundless Ambition

A Clear Vision for Better Care

Zaineh Abbad & Tala Hamdan

Zaineh and Tala earned national recognition through their Jordan Young Scientists (JoYS) project, *“Binocular Visual Rehabilitation via Gamification for Pediatric Amblyopia.”*

The young innovators developed a VR-based therapy for children aged 6 to 12, using gameplay and multisensory stimulation to support visual improvement and binocular coordination.

Their efforts secured second place at the national level, a proud moment that reflects Jubilee School’s commitment to encouraging meaningful research and student-led innovation.



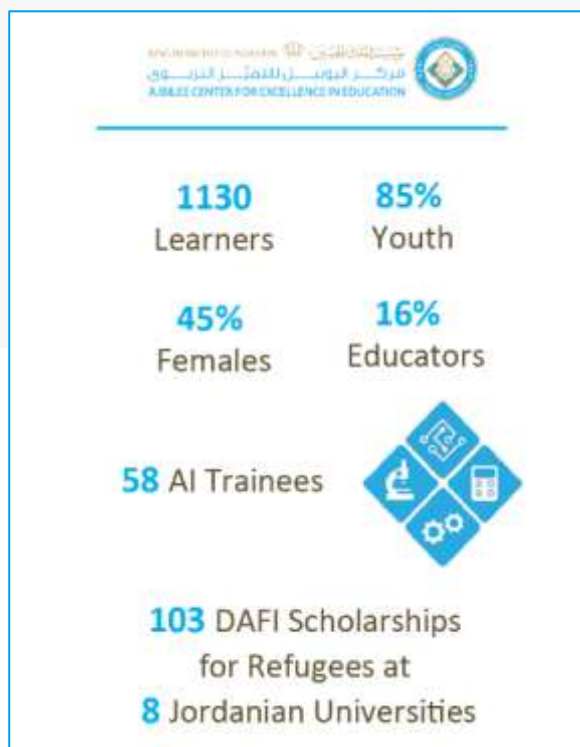
A Young Researcher Transforming Diabetes Care

Marah Aladwan

Marah’s passion for scientific innovation led her excel and publish her research in the *Sphinx Journal of Pharmaceutical and Medical Sciences*, presenting: *“Breath-Based, Non-Invasive Detection of Diabetic Ketoacidosis in Adolescents (DKA) Using the MQ135 Sensor.”*

Despite the complexity of developing a low-cost, non-invasive testing method, Marah’s determination to create a painless and accessible alternative for young individuals at risk of DKA drove her forward, an effort inspired by her uncle, who lost his sight due to diabetes.

The **Jubilee Center for Excellence in Education** strengthens education systems through innovative learning models, advanced educator training, and the strategic use of educational technology to support future-ready education in Jordan and the region.



Equipping Minds for the Future

The Power of STEAM and AI

The [Jubilee Center for Excellence in Education](#) (JCEE) advances STEAM and AI education for youth and educators in Jordan and beyond through training and competitions, building skills for success in a rapidly evolving world.

Math and Chess Olympiad

Participants

The National Finals of the Math and Chess Olympiad brought together **145** young talents from four governorates to compete and showcase their analytical and strategic abilities.

Impact

The Olympiad generated national interest for replication and demonstrated a scalable model for integrating STEM learning with strategic thinking.

STEM Racing Supported by Formula 1

Participants

The National STEM Racing Challenge brought together 53 students and coaches from public and private schools across Jordan to compete with innovative projects that showcased engineering skills, teamwork, and creativity.

Impact

The challenge strengthened practical STEM skills, fostered creativity and collaboration, and encouraged a culture of innovation within participating schools.



Equipping Minds for the Future

The Power of STEAM and AI

Stockholm Junior Water Prize (SJWP)

Participants

For the first time in Jordan, **19 students (45% female)**, forming **10 teams** from public and private schools in Amman, Salt, and Madaba, participated in the SJWP competition under the guidance of **10 educators**. This pioneering competition showcased student-led water research projects and recognized finalists for their creativity, scientific rigor, and practical solutions.

Impact

The competition fosters scientific inquiry, environmental awareness, and problem-solving skills, inspiring youth to pursue sustainable solutions to water challenges.



Equipping Minds for the Future

The Power of STEAM and AI

Using AI Tools in Education Training

Participants

58 public-school teachers from Amman and Karak, representing Arabic, mathematics, science, and English, took part in the training.

Workshops

Sessions focused on integrating artificial intelligence into classroom practice and using digital tools to enhance active learning and smart assessment.

Impact

The training enhanced teachers' digital and pedagogical competencies, enabling the effective use of AI tools and the design of technology-enabled, student-centered learning and assessment practices.

Transfer of Knowledge to Yemen

JCEE built the capacity of teachers to manage annual FIRST LEGO League competitions.

A partnership agreement was concluded with Balqis School for the second consecutive year to foster knowledge exchange and training for gifted students.



Testing Services

JSAT and EPoC Tests

Evaluated 460 students' academic readiness and creative abilities to enroll in Jubilee School.

United World Colleges Scholarship Exam

Assessed 19 applicants to determine eligibility for scholarships to the prestigious United World Colleges, ensuring opportunities were awarded to the most outstanding candidates.

DAFI Program Builds Brighter Futures

The **DAFI** (Albert Einstein German Academic Refugee Initiative) program empowers refugee youth through access to higher education.

Beyond providing scholarships, DAFI program managed in Jordan by the JCEE for the last 15 years, fosters skills development, leadership, and community engagement, enabling students to contribute meaningfully to their communities.

A Journey of Determination and Innovation

Juman, Malak, Salma, and Rahaf

For the first time, a team of students from a public school in Ramtha entered STEM Racing 2025, testing creativity, precision, and teamwork. With limited resources and no prior experience, they designed and programmed a racing model under tight timelines. Juman, Malak, Salma, and Rahaf rose to the challenge, turning setbacks into resilience. Their success earned recognition from the Ministry of Education's Director of Education in Ramtha and secured a new partnership with Jordan University of Science and Technology, opening access to advanced labs.

From a relentless learner to AI Innovator

Raneem Ghalioun

A Syrian refugee and proud DAFI alumna, Raneem pursued higher education in Jordan through the DAFI scholarship, graduating at the top of her Computer Science class at Philadelphia University. She later deepened her expertise in artificial intelligence and software engineering, launching a successful career in Canada's technology sector. Beyond her professional accomplishments, Raneem actively mentors young people, advocates for women in STEM, and co-founded an AI startup in Canada. Her journey reflects how the DAFI program turns access to education into long-term opportunity, leadership, and lasting impact.

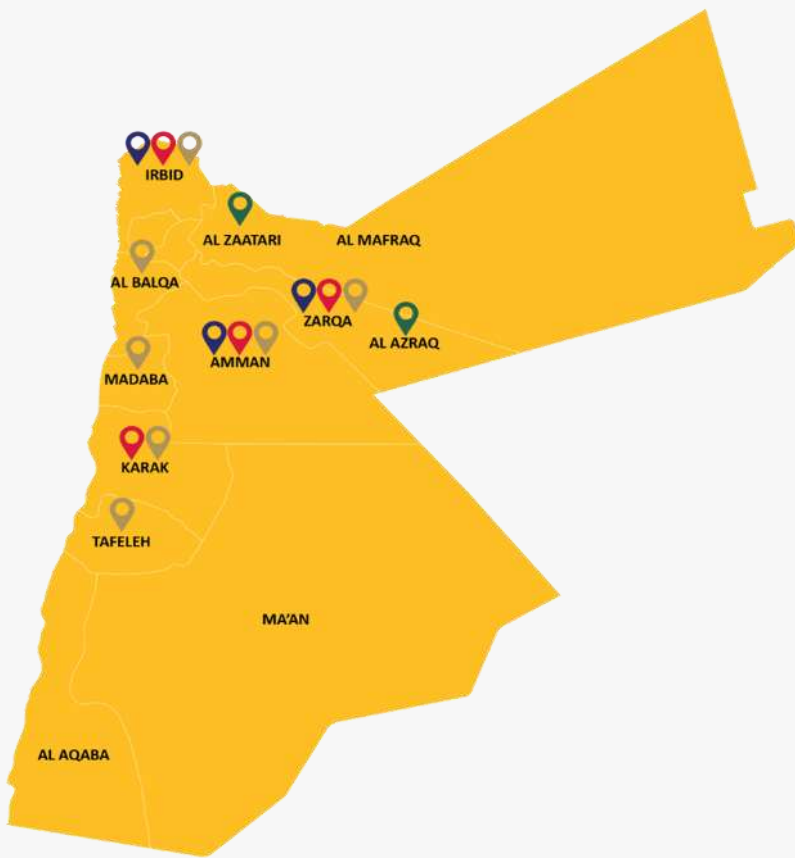

Nurturing Health and Well-Being

Boosting Women's Access to Primary Health Care Services

Building on its established expertise in sexual and reproductive health (SRH), the Institute for Family Health (IFH) continues to advance its comprehensive SRH service model to ensure inclusive access for women and men across all life stages. The model places particular emphasis on adolescents, women experiencing menopause, individuals with chronic illnesses, and adults in the post-reproductive phase, ensuring that each group receives tailored information, counseling, and clinical care within a holistic continuum of SRH services.

Primary health services for women

- 32,400 SRH-related services to 21,243 women
- 3347 pediatric services to 801 children

- Premarital counselling
- Pre and postnatal care
- Family planning
- Treatment for sexually transmitted infections and urinary tract infections
- Post abortion care
- Anemia treatment
- Screening for reproductive tract cancers
- Clinical management of rape
- Nutritional assessment



Nurturing Health and Well-Being

To expand community outreach and early detection efforts, IFH organizes free health days, targeted awareness sessions, and thematic health campaigns. These activities serve as key entry points for screening potential cases and providing specialized counseling and follow-up care for individuals in need.

Outreach Activities for Beneficiaries

- 17,620 individuals supported through outreach and community campaigns delivering critical medical and psychosocial care.



Protection & Mental Health

IFH responds to ongoing protection needs in host communities and Syrian refugee camps by promoting Gender-Based Violence (GBV) awareness and creating safer environments.

Survivors receive confidential case management, online and in person support, along with urgent cash assistance to meet immediate needs.

Integrated life-skills activities, such as carpentry, hairdressing, and crafts, support recovery by building confidence, livelihoods, and long-term resilience.

- **Prevention and empowerment** activities for **103,737 women and girls**

- Sexual and reproductive health training for adolescents and their families reached **52 beneficiaries**

- Youth engagement activities **286** & Mental Health and Psychosocial Support training reached **2,092 beneficiaries**



Protection & Mental Health

In partnership with UNICEF, IFH delivers integrated child protection and mental health services for vulnerable children and families in camps and host communities. The program focuses on violence prevention, mental health and psychosocial support, positive parenting, and comprehensive child protection and gender-based violence (GBV) case management.

The program also strengthens the capacity of local service providers and expands early identification systems through screenings that detect children with disabilities and assess their need for assistive devices, ensuring timely referrals and safer, more inclusive environments.

Mental Health & Psychosocial Support (MHPSS)

Jordan's first Psychosocial Counseling Center, established at IFH, provides basic and advanced mental health and psychosocial support services for vulnerable individuals, including survivors of gender-based violence, war-related trauma, torture, and organized violence.

Elevating Hope

IFH continues to foster youth-driven movements that champion mental health advocacy by equipping communities with essential knowledge and empowering young leaders to drive lasting positive change. Through its continued support to Circle of Hope, *Naya*, a youth-led initiative focused on mental health awareness, IFH trainers contribute to strengthening the initiative's reach and effectiveness.



Redefining Inclusion and Rehabilitation

IFH transformed four of its main centers into fully accessible facilities for **persons with disabilities (PWDs)**, ensuring equitable access to high-quality health, rehabilitation services, and information. To meet the growing demand for diagnostic and therapeutic support, particularly for children with learning and physical disabilities, Sweileh and Irbid centers were further expanded to include new speech and physiotherapy units.

Rehabilitation for PWDs

9,313 beneficiaries were provided with

15,155 rehabilitation services which include

comprehensive assessment, special education, speech therapy, physiotherapy, and occupational therapy

Inclusive Eye Care for Children

In 2025, IFH schoolteachers and volunteers conducted **37,000** vision screenings in schools and community-based organizations, ensuring early detection of refractive errors among children. A total of **4,010** beneficiaries were further assessed by optometrists and ophthalmologists, with **2,666** eyeglasses distributed to school-aged children and their caregivers.

To strengthen the sustainability of school-based eye health services, IFH optometrists trained **104** Ministry of Education teachers across Irbid, East Amman, Karak, and Zarqa on vision screening techniques, providing each with a vision screening kit for use in their schools.



Leading National Programs

Himaya

Through the five-year *Himaya* program, IFH is contributing to Jordan's national protection system for GBV survivors by building the capacity of healthcare and protection providers. Training across the public, private, and community sectors focuses on survivor-centered care, clinical management of GBV, safe referral pathways, case management, and rights-based, coordinated responses aligned with national protection priorities. By 2025, **650** professionals had been trained, bringing the total to **920** since the program's launch in November 2024, thereby improving the quality, accessibility, and coordination of services for survivors of violence against women in Jordan.



Identification Card for Persons with Disabilities

IFH continues to lead the implementation of the groundbreaking Identification Card for Persons with Disabilities (PWDs) program, which was launched in 2022 in partnership with the Higher Council for the Rights of Persons with Disabilities and the Ministry of Health. Through multidisciplinary medical committees, individuals with disabilities receive accurate diagnoses that are recorded on their personal identification cards. This system streamlines access to essential medical and public services, reduces bureaucratic barriers, and helps prevent forgery.

During 2025, a total of **12,763** individuals were assessed across Amman, Irbid, and Karak regions, with mobile teams deployed to underserved areas and home visits conducted to ensure equitable access for individuals with limited mobility. To date, more than **41,000** persons with disabilities have been professionally diagnosed nationwide.

Testing Global Programs

Building on a successful partnership with the University of New South Wales, IFH is piloting *PM+ Parenting*, an evidence-based mental health intervention that strengthens parenting skills and improves children's well-being.

The study reached 400 adults and enrolled **200** caregivers in structured group sessions in Sweileh and Karak, generating evidence to strengthen caregiver resilience and support children's emotional and behavioral health.



Building Capacity for Sustainable Growth

IFH's comprehensive service model and long-standing expertise in health, protection, and rehabilitation have positioned it as a leading national training hub, working in collaboration with Jordanian universities and international agencies to build professional capacity across multiple sectors.

- **2,144 participants** received training on GBV, SRH, disability topics from national, international organizations, civil society, government institutions, universities, and hospitals
- **60 students** enrolled in the IFH internship program from **22 universities**
- **291 IFH staff and volunteers** received training on GBV, PSEA, case management, and human rights topics

Regional Reach

IFH collaborated with the Center for Egyptian Women's Legal Assistance (CEWLA), an NGO in Egypt, to enhance its technical capacity in various areas, including monitoring and evaluation, staff well-being, and problem management. Over the next three years, IFH will continue providing tailored support to strengthen CEWLA's operations and impact.



Inspiring Success Stories

Seeing Clearly, Standing Tall

Ameer

Six-year-old Ameer, a Syrian refugee from a family of seven, was forced to leave school due to severe vision problems. Cut off from learning and play, his situation worsened when a car accident left him with a serious leg injury and confined him to bed.

After his family connected with the Institute for Family Health in Zarqa, Ameer received a comprehensive eye examination and high-quality prescription glasses. For the first time, he could see clearly, recognizing his mother's face, reading letters on the board, and rejoining his classmates.

His mother shared, "When he put the glasses on and smiled, I knew this was the beginning of something new for him and for us."

With his vision restored, Ameer returned to school with renewed confidence. He rediscovered his love for learning and now dreams of becoming a doctor, inspired to help others as he was helped.

Empowered Expression

Salma

Seventeen-year-old Salma had long struggled with verbal abuse from her father whenever her academic performance declined. The constant pressure affected her confidence and emotional well-being, leaving her unsure of how to cope.

Through the program's counseling and support services, Salma gained the confidence to address the issue openly. With guidance from IFH counselors, her father also came to understand the harm caused by his words and gradually adopted a more supportive approach.

Steps Toward Independence

Wafaa

Wafaa is a young girl living with a severe developmental intellectual disability that affected her mobility, balance, and early communication. Before joining the program, she relied on a walker and struggled with basic movements and coordination.

Through the project's home-based rehabilitation services, delivered in close partnership with her family, Wafaa received tailored and consistent support. Within seven months, she progressed from using a walker to walking independently, improved her balance and postural control, and began following simple instructions, reflecting early gains in communication and understanding.

Wafaa's progress highlights the impact of personalized, home-based rehabilitation in fostering greater independence and improving quality of life.

Our Work in Socio-Economic Empowerment



The **Community Development Institute** empowers marginalized individuals, families, and civil society organizations through entrepreneurship training, innovative finance, and work opportunities, fostering sustainable livelihoods and inclusive socio-economic and environmental sustainability.



Creating Sustainable Livelihoods

Fostering Youth's Role in Community Development

Through capacity-building training, fourteen staff members from the Hashemite University's Consultation and Community Service Center strengthened their skills in community mobilization, partnership development, initiative design, and civic engagement, to enhance youth engagement in community development in Zarqa and Mafraq.

Simultaneously, **100** university students were equipped with the tools to assess community needs and lead responsive local initiatives. Students have already begun applying their skills through field visits in Zarqa and Mafraq, where they are developing community profiles that map key service providers, stakeholders, and pressing local challenges. These profiles will guide the students' design and implementation of initiatives that respond directly to community needs.



Creating Sustainable Livelihoods

Transforming Textile Waste into Green Opportunities

This three-year program, implemented in partnership with Beyond Capital and Fabric Aid, employs a market-systems development approach to support job creation, accelerate green and circular enterprises, expand income-generating opportunities, and enhance civil society capacity. These efforts strengthen Jordan's garment sector and improve livelihoods for Jordanians and Syrian refugees throughout the textile value chain.

Results at a Glance

- 25** green and circular SMEs accelerated
- 28** jobs created
- 48** micro-businesses launched or strengthened
- 200** clothing-collection bins deployed
- 4** Business Support Hubs established at CBOs

As part of efforts to further empower women, **200** survivors of gender-based violence (GBV) gained access to safe programs for economic support and mental health, in collaboration with the Institute for Family Health.



Creating Sustainable Livelihoods

Enterprise and Business Development

CDI is launching an entrepreneurship ideation program in Aqaba and Karak to support aspiring and early-stage entrepreneurs in transforming ideas into early, testable solutions aligned with local needs. To date, **37** entrepreneurs in Aqaba have completed the *Generate Your Business Idea* training, applying structured tools to develop viable concepts and test solutions with target users, refining their ideas through real-time feedback.

Building on this ideation phase, each entrepreneur then pitched their refined concept to an expert committee and received tailored mentoring and technical guidance. This progression strengthened participants' creativity, problem-solving skills, and readiness to launch or scale their ventures.



Creating Sustainable Livelihoods

Gender Equality and Social Cohesion Project

Through extended consultation support, the capacities of **64** staff members from the Ministry of Social Development's Local Community Development Centers (LCDC) (**56%** of whom are women) were strengthened to advance gender equality, social cohesion, and community service delivery across Amman, Karak, and Jerash.

Staff gained practical skills in community needs assessment, stakeholder engagement, partnership building, and inclusive consultation, and were prepared for a study tour in France to learn from international best practices. Follow-up evaluation assessed outcomes and provided recommendations to support the translation of lessons learned into improved local practice, reinforcing LCDCs as coordinated, gender-responsive community hubs.



Inspiring Success Stories

Wheels of Success

Hanem Salameh

Hanem, a 37-year-old from Manshiyet Bani Hassan in Mafraq, turned a personal challenge into a pioneering business. A trip to Irbid just to fix her son's bicycle revealed a gap in local services and sparked her decision to fill it.

Through CDI's entrepreneurship training and mentoring, she launched Eco Ride, using a grant to purchase tools, wheels, accessories, and an air compressor.

Today, Hanem operates the area's only bicycle maintenance shop, repairing, assembling, and renting bikes to residents. Despite early resistance in a male-dominated field, her determination -supported by her husband's support - helped her succeed.

Her income has increased by nearly 50%, easing school and household expenses. Recently, she gained approval from the Ministry of Tourism to rent bicycles at the Umm Jamal archaeological site and develop cycling paths, expanding her business into a promising tourism opportunity.



Inspiring Success Stories

Beauty, Resilience, and a New Beginning

Arwa Al Mahmoud

Arwa, a 20-year-old Syrian refugee from Daraa living in Mazar–Irbid, transformed a long-held passion into a sustainable livelihood. As the eldest of six siblings, she spent years styling the hair and makeup of her sisters and neighbors but lacked the tools and resources to pursue her dream professionally.

When CDI invited her to join the entrepreneurship and technical training program, Arwa immediately knew the business she wanted to create. With a grant and a clear business plan, she established a fully equipped home-based beauty salon.

Despite her family’s initial hesitation, Arwa earned their support and now serves a growing circle of clients. Her income has increased by **200%**, allowing her to support her family and move closer to her goal of opening her own beauty salon.



Our Work in Research & Advocacy



The **Information and Research Center** conducts participatory research and evidence-based advocacy to advance inclusive national development. It equips policymakers, practitioners, and civil society with actionable knowledge, shapes national dialogue, and leverages human rights mechanisms to strengthen social protection and inclusive policies.



Advancing SRHR for Young Women and Marginalized Groups in Jordan

In 2025, IRCKHF advanced rights-based sexual and reproductive health and rights (SRHR) by translating evidence into concrete national safeguards for young women and marginalized groups, particularly women with disabilities.

Its shadow report to the UN Committee Against Torture (CAT) prompted a formal government request for the development of a national procedural manual governing hysterectomy cases.

Building on this milestone, IRCKHF conducted follow-up research and consultations with government entities, health authorities, and civil society, integrating policy analysis, institutional capacity strengthening, and multi-stakeholder engagement to sustain national dialogue and support legislative and health-system reform.

Policy Impact

- Developed a policy paper to prevent non-consensual hysterectomy for women with disabilities
- Drafted amendments to maternal and family planning service instructions
- Reviewed primary healthcare accreditation standards
- Proposed the establishment of a National AIDS Coordination Committee
- Submitted an alternative report on forced sterilization to the UN Committee Against Torture



Strengthening GBV Policy Reform Through Evidence-Based Research

IRCKHF strengthened Jordan's national response to gender-based violence by anchoring policy reform in rigorous evidence and survivor-centered analysis.

The project applied mixed-methods research, legal analysis, and structured consultations with the Ministry of Health, Ministry of Social Development, Ministry of Justice, the Judicial Council, the Family and Juvenile Protection Department, and leading civil society organizations, ensuring cross-sector alignment and policy advancement.

Policy Impact

- Produced two national policy papers on Domestic Violence Law reform and GBV data systems
- Identified operational and legal gaps through cross-sector consultations
- Secured formal adoption of both policy papers by national authorities



Advancing Mobility and Justice for Egyptian Migrant Workers in Jordan

Labor justice was advanced by addressing restrictive mobility practices and exploitative controls that affect Egyptian migrant workers in Jordan.

By documenting employer control over exit and return permits and clearance certificates, IRCKHF translated evidence into coordinated national advocacy efforts that mobilized civil society organizations, labor experts, media actors, and government stakeholders, and contributing directly to Jordan's Universal Periodic Review process.

Policy Impact

- Exit and return permits were cancelled in 2025, restoring freedom of movement
- Targeted exemptions were introduced for clearance certificates
- Reduced risks of exploitation, extortion, and irregularity
- Strengthened Jordan's compliance with international labor standards



Enhancing Legal Protection for Migrant Workers and Trafficking Victims

National legal and institutional protections for migrant workers and victims of trafficking were strengthened through coordinated advocacy and public engagement efforts facilitated by IRCKHF.

The initiative combined legislative drafting and advocacy briefs with a large-scale media campaign, alongside sustained engagement with government institutions, journalists, academics, and civil society actors. Targeted capacity-building efforts further strengthened media professionalism and sector-specific expertise.

Policy Impact

- Developed legislative amendment proposals and advocacy briefs
- Established Jordan's **first** multi-stakeholder national committee dedicated to migrant worker protection
- Trained **17** journalists on migrant worker and trafficking-related issues
- Achieved over **60%** government participation across national events
- Reached over **642,000** people through national media engagement



Strengthening Inclusive Sexual and Reproductive Health Policies Through National Dialogue

IRCKHF advanced inclusive SRH policy reform by convening national stakeholders around the rights of women, children, and persons with disabilities.

A two-day national conference brought together the Ministry of Health, the Higher Council for the Rights of Persons with Disabilities, Sharia Courts, academics, and civil society to assess policy gaps, review existing practices, and co-develop actionable reform recommendations.

Policy Impact

- Identified systemic gaps in maternal, child, and disability-inclusive SRH services
- Recommended binding hospital protocols for uterus removal procedures
- Proposed updates to maternal and child health guidelines
- Reinforced national commitment to equitable, rights-based healthcare



Supporting Survivors of Technology-Facilitated Violence Against Women

IRCKHF strengthened national responses to technology-facilitated violence against women by addressing emerging digital risks through innovation, dialogue, and policy-oriented action.

The project introduced practical tools, including an Interactive Guide for University Professors, a national moot court competition, and a podcast series.

Consultations with legal experts, government institutions, civil society, and frontline practitioners identified legal, cultural, and systemic barriers to reporting and protection.

Policy Impact

- Identified emerging risks such as digital impersonation and cybercrime evidence gaps
- Promoted confidential referral pathways and stronger institutional coordination
- Raised awareness of survivor-centered reporting mechanisms
- Developed a prioritized national action matrix to guide future policy and legal reform



Navigating the Digital World Safely

The 16 Days of Activism campaign (11 November–11 December 2025) raised awareness of technology-facilitated violence (TFV) and promoted stronger protection for women and young people from online abuse. Delivered through IRCKHF’s digital platforms and targeting women, youth aged 16–24, civil society, and policymakers, the campaign stimulated dialogue and equipped audiences with practical knowledge to prevent and respond to digital violence.

The campaign featured six podcasts and eight short video reels addressing key TFV issues, including:

- Digital violence against persons with disabilities and its impact on public participation
- Financial fraud targeting young people
- Digital violence in gaming environments
- Online violence against female journalists
- Digital electoral violence and disinformation
- Key statistics on digital violence in Jordan
- Illustrative court cases involving digital abuse
- Psychological and social consequences of digital violence
- Practical guidance on online safety

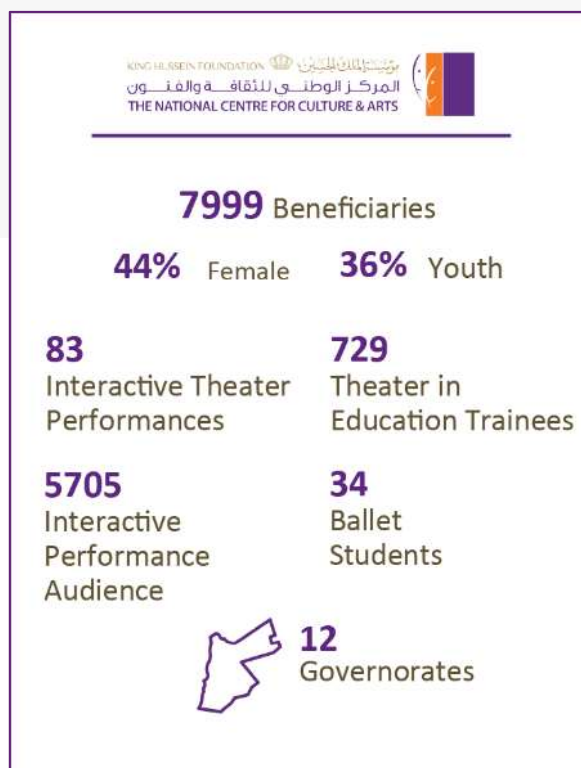

Our Work in Culture & Society



The **National Centre For Culture & Arts** leverages theatre and performing arts to advance education, social development, and cross-cultural dialogue, positioning creativity as a catalyst for meaningful and lasting social change. Beyond this, it advances international cultural exchange, showcasing Jordan's artistic heritage on the global stage.



Breaking Barriers Through Story and Stage

In communities where social norms often limit women's choices and opportunities, NCCA responds by bringing stories to life on stage.

Through **16** interactive performances of "*Touristic Ambition*" across Aqaba, Wadi Rum, and Petra, women and community members were invited into open conversations about work, aspiration, and opportunity within the tourism and creative industries.

The dialogue extended beyond the theatre through television and radio interviews, as well as three televised features highlighting inspirational Jordanian women whose journeys reflected resilience and potential.

Together, these efforts helped shift public perceptions and foster greater acceptance of women's economic participation.



Cultivating Peaceful Mindsets Across Jordan's Schools

Addressing community needs for dialogue and non-violent communication, NCCA delivered **28 performances** of "*Boat*", an interactive theatre production inspired by refugee women's stories, across Jordan.

The play engaged youth, educators, and community members in exploring empathy, shared challenges, and peaceful approaches to conflict.

To support wider application, two drama-based conflict resolution guidebooks were developed, alongside drama workshops in **12 schools** that reached **420 students**. Additionally, **40 teachers** received practical training on using drama as a tool for conflict resolution, expanding the initiative's impact across schools and communities.



Vocational Choices, Brighter Futures

Responding to the need to strengthen youth employment prospects, “*Out of the Box*” was delivered through **18** performances promoting Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET) and the BTEC system (Business and Technology Education Council), whose qualifications offer applied, skills-based learning that bridges education and employment.

The initiative addressed persistent stereotypes around vocational pathways and reinforced their role in supporting progression from school to higher education and the labor market.

These efforts were supported by the development of a specialized manual, *Interactive Activities to Enhance Life Skills and Work Ethics*, produced in cooperation with the Vocational Training Corporation (VTC) and the College of Advanced Vocational Training (CAVT) at Al Hussein Technical University. In parallel, **180** trainees from VTC and CAVT participated in theatre-based soft-skills training, strengthening employability, work ethics, and workplace readiness.

The initiative concluded with a national *Skills for Success* event, highlighting outcomes and policy relevance, and supported by wide media coverage across major television channels.



Young Leaders Shaping Change Across Borders

To equip young leaders with practical tools to challenge harmful social norms within their communities, six-day Theatre-Based Training (TBT) programs were delivered in **Mongolia and Laos**. The training enabled **60 participants** from UNFPA youth networks and civil society organizations to develop facilitation skills, explore behaviour-change approaches, and apply theatre techniques to spark dialogue and collective reflection.



Expanding Impact Through Collaborative Community Theatre

In partnership with the Institute for Family Health (IFH), six performances of "*The Fisherman*" were delivered to engage youth and community groups in reflective storytelling around personal growth and social responsibility.

The initiative also included tailored training workshops for **20** staff members from the corporate sector, using theatre-based methods to strengthen communication, teamwork, and problem-solving skills in the workplace.

In parallel, **13** young participants took part in Theatre-Based Techniques training that encouraged creative expression and supported their leadership potential.

Additional performances delivered for the Crown Prince Foundation reached 593 beneficiaries, expanding the project's impact across diverse sectors, including youth groups, NGOs, and private-sector companies.

Carrying Jordan's Story to the World Stage

Featuring dancers trained by the NCCA's Dance Department, a series of performances showcased Jordan's cultural heritage and contemporary artistic expression locally and internationally, offering audiences a vibrant window into Jordanian creativity.

Two dance performances brought emerging dancers to a Jordanian audience of 660, using dynamic choreography grounded in shared human experiences.”

On the international stage, 21 Jordanian dancers represented the nation at **Expo 2025 in Japan**, showcasing the richness of Jordan's artistic identity to global audiences.

Together, these efforts strengthened cultural visibility and celebrated Jordan's evolving dance scene at home and abroad.



Strengthening Global Cultural Bridges

To expand the global presence of Jordanian arts and strengthen international partnerships, a series of cultural engagements and collaborations were carried out across multiple regions.

NCCA participated in the Seminar on the Integration of Culture and Technology for Belt and Road Countries in **Beijing**.

Jordanian representation continued at the Edinburgh International Festival in the **UK** and the ITI Regional Meeting in **Fujairah, UAE**, fostering wider artistic exchange and sector connectivity.

Interactive Theatre workshops were also conducted in **Salalah, Oman**, offering practitioners and institutions new approaches to creative learning and community engagement.



Our Work in Culture & Society



The **National Music Conservatory** delivers accredited Arabic and classical music programs that nurture musical appreciation and develop highly qualified musicians at every stage of learning. As Jordan’s first academic music institution, it strengthens the national musical landscape through performance, training, talent development, and international engagement that amplifies Jordan’s musical identity

The exchange promoted cultural dialogue and broadened students' artistic perspectives.

As a testament to the NMC's commitment to inclusive music education in Jordan, a group of **11** musicians — including three talented members with disabilities — represented the Conservatory at the Global Disability Summit in Berlin. Their participation showcased Jordan's cultural diplomacy and highlighted the power of music in advancing inclusion and representation on a global stage.



Where Jordan Meets the World in Harmony

Rubu' Qarn Foundation Workshops & Concert

The NMC partnered with the Rubu' Qarn Foundation of **Sharjah, UAE**, to deliver workshops for **19 Emirati** music students, fostering shared learning and regional exchange.

The collaboration culminated in a full-house joint concert at the Al Hussein Cultural Center in Amman, widely commended for celebrating cultural dialogue and artistic collaboration.

The orchestra also joined world-renowned artist Sami Yusuf in a powerful performance that blended orchestral sound with spiritual music traditions, resonating strongly with the audience.



Nurturing Tomorrow's Music Therapists

Advancing Music Therapy Education and Community Impact

As part of a strategic effort to promote and expand music therapy in Jordan and beyond, the National Music Conservatory advanced its Music Therapy program through a six-month specialized course accredited by the European Music Therapy Confederation, equipping healthcare professionals and social workers with strengthened therapeutic practice skills.

The year also marked a major milestone with the NMC's first Master's graduate in Music Therapy, representing a significant regional advancement in the field of therapeutic arts.



Where Music Becomes a Tool for Healing and Service

Preparations are underway to launch a dedicated music therapy course for International Baccalaureate (IB) students, aligned with the Creativity, Activity, and Service (CAS) framework. The program will offer experiential, community-based learning that demonstrates how music can support healing and wellbeing, with no prior musical background required.



Upholding International Music Examination Excellence

As the official ABRSM representative in Jordan since 1989, the NMC once again hosted the year's practical examinations and advanced theory assessments, serving **147** music students from NMC and across Jordan, while also managing more than **500** online applicants. These examinations support students' musical development and provided internationally recognized pathways for academic and professional advancement.


In support of continuous music advancement, the NMC participated in a two-day workshop with ABRSM representatives from Europe and the Middle East, strengthening shared standards and deepening institutional knowledge of online examination systems, regulatory frameworks, and the 2026 syllabus for both in-person and digital assessments.

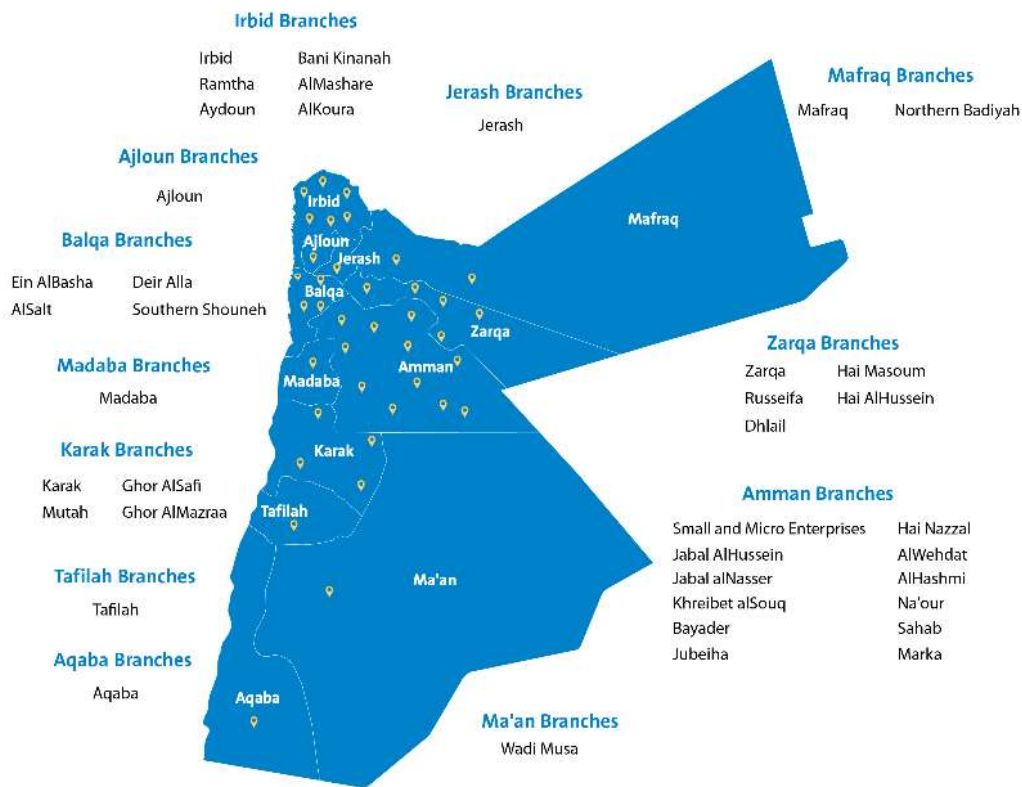

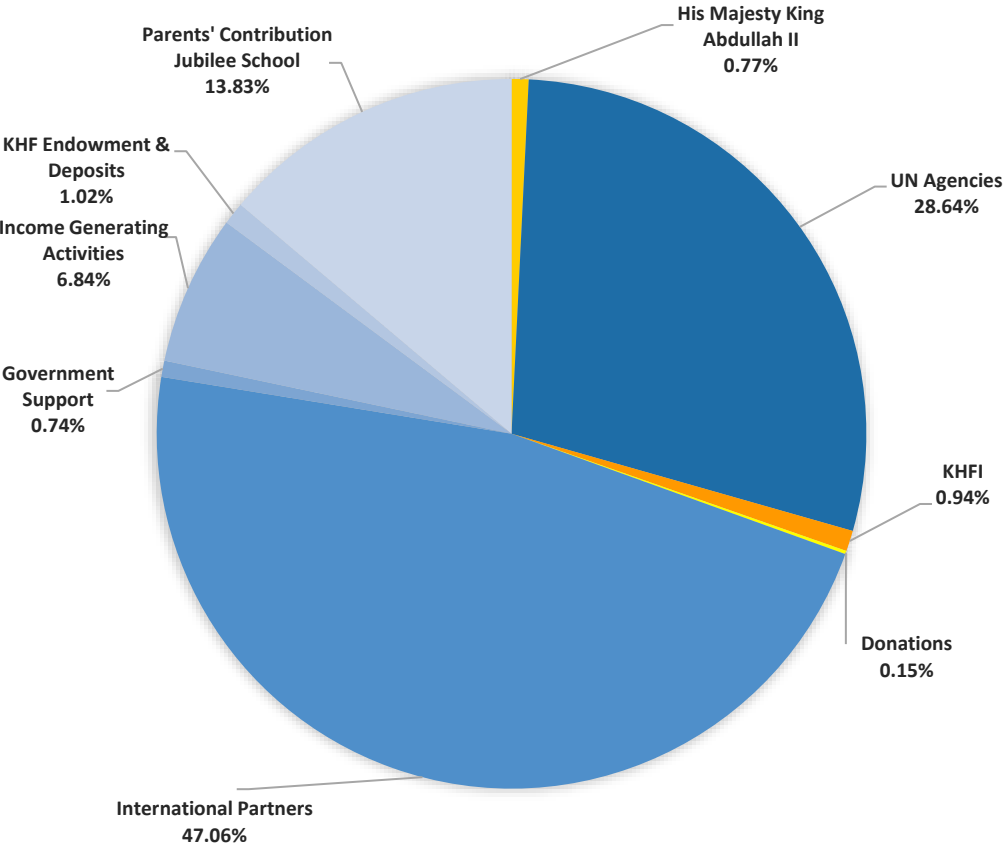

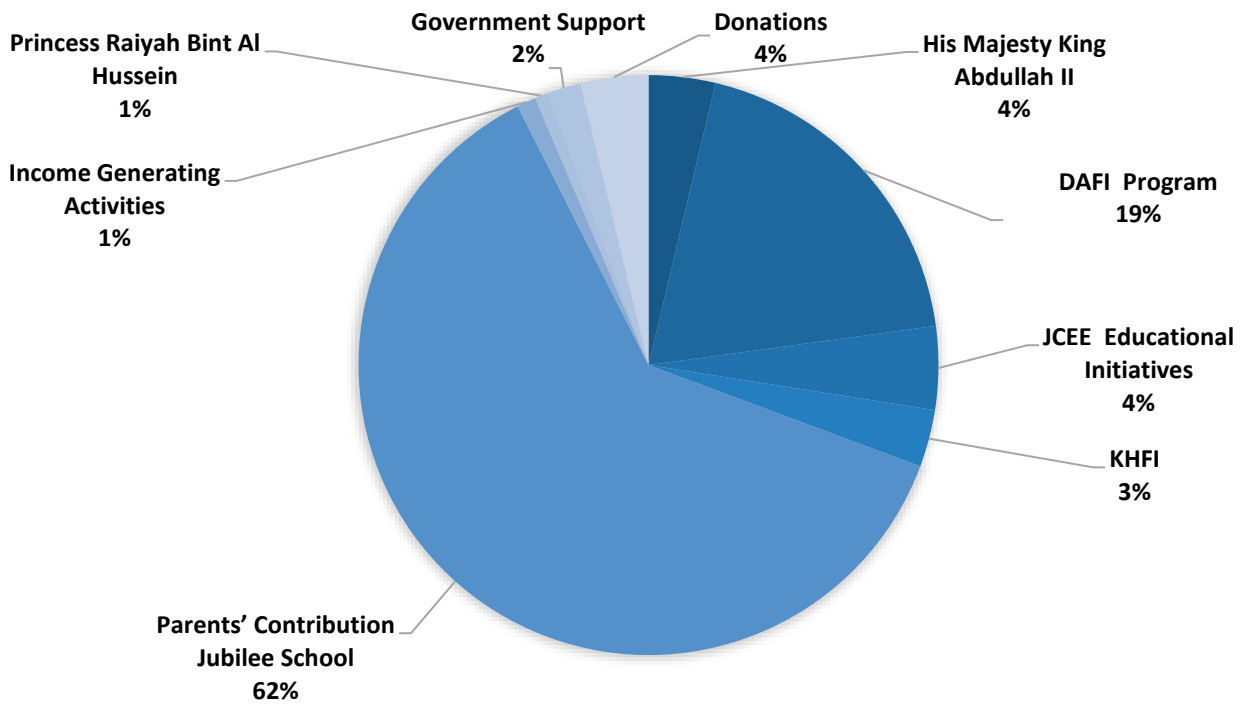

***Sources of Income 2025**

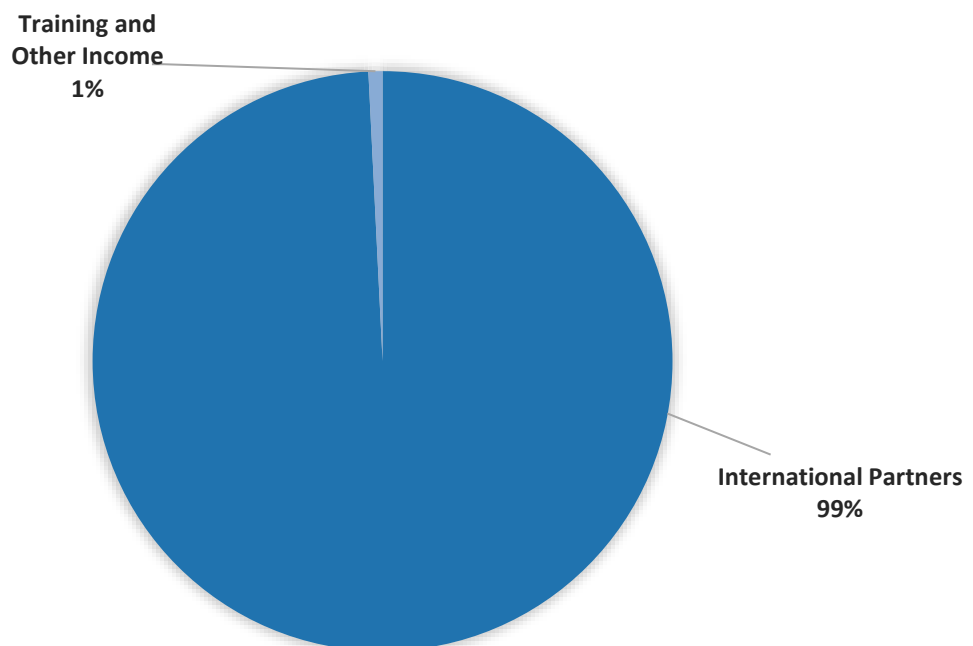
